Council services availability end-of-year 2024

Council's main office will be closed from midday Tuesday, 24 December 2024 and will re-open Monday, 6 January 2025. Most Council services will either have reduced opening hours or be closed entirely during this period. Normal hours will resume Monday, 6 January 2025.

Over the past few months, we've been renewing roads at three Rangitāiki Plains sites, improving the Whakatāne District's roading network. The initial focus included a large section of Thornton Road, followed by an area within West Bank Road 'north'. Both sites have now been completed, including road sealing and line marking, and are open to all traffic. Road shoulder excavations on West Bank Road 'south' (between Gow Road and property number 504 West Bank Road) were completed earlier this month, preparing for shoulder widening works and resealing in the new year. Following the Christmas break, crews will return to site in early January to complete this work. Please note, from approximately January 6, 2025, this section of West Bank Road will be closed to everyone except residents and businesses until end of February (weather dependant). Plan ahead and allow extra time for detours.



Edgecumbe Blue Light

The Edgecumbe Fireworks event in November was a fantastic success, enjoyed by everyone who attended. The evening featured plenty of delicious kai, and the fireworks display was safely and expertly handled by our awesome Local Fire Brigade. Edgecumbe Community Plan revisit 2025

The Edgecumbe Collective has been committed to working collaboratively to oversee the delivery of the community plan for the last seven years. In 2025 community engagement will start with a key focus on revisiting the community plan goals and aspirations. Engagement will

start early in the new year, and we look forward to receiving feedback from the community through the different engagement options, which will include a survey and community hui.



Matatā Community Plan

The Matatā Community Plan is now complete, following a process initiated earlier this year by the Matatā Collective with a community survey. The Matatā Collective includes representatives from Matatā community groups, organisations and community members including Ngāti Rangitihi, Matatā Bluelight, Matatā Volunteer Fire Brigade and Matatā Residents Association. The information collected from the community



has formed the key focus of the plan, and copies are now available on the Residents Association Facebook page. Next steps include presentations to the community and key stakeholders, which will be held in the new year.

Purchase of Tahi Hill Farm – Matatā Wastewater project

Council has taken a significant step toward addressing long-standing environmental and public health challenges in Matatā by securing a key piece of land for a centralised wastewater system.

The purchase of the property at 138 Caverhill Road marks a strategic move in the ongoing efforts to develop a much-needed wastewater treatment system for the area. Securing this property is a major step forward for the Matatā Wastewater Project. The land provides a foundation for us to create a more sustainable and environmentally responsible wastewater system that will benefit the entire community.

The 56-hectare property will use approximately two hectares for the treatment facility, with approximately 15 hectares suitable for the irrigation of treated wastewater.
