

Edgecumbe History

The early years of Edgecumbe:

- Original Māori Names: Okope name of the land and Kaiwhakatere the landing place of the canoes. lwi: Ngāti awa Hapū: Te Patutaatahi
- In 1914, the cutting of the river to the sea made thousands of hectares of land across the plains available for farming
- This led to the establishment of Riverslea school
- Edgecumbe was the last village to develop on the Rangitāiki Plains, and quickly became a township after the opening of the Rangitāiki Plains Dairy Co-op in 1923
- Settlers at the time met to discuss a name for the growing community and decided to rename the new township Edgecumbe
- Edgecumbe township's infrastructure included a grocery, butchery, post office, churches, hotel, garage, rail extensions, picture theatre, electric power station, mills, doctor's surgery, War Memorial Hall and a new bridge opening in 1950
- As the township grew so did housing subdivisions, extending the town
- Rangitāiki Agriculture and Pastoral Association accrued a grant of 10 acres for a Domain Reserve, this saw the development of the 'Edgecumbe Domain'

The Golden Years: 1960s-1980s

- Thriving sport clubs included, outdoor bowling, hockey, rugby, squash, go karting, badminton, netball and touch rugby
- Community groups also popular were scouts, girl guides, brownies, CWI and Lions
- 1967 Edgecumbe Town Clock was raised in the central square
- Edgecumbe College had a steady roll of approximately 400 students and Primary School reached almost 600
- 1974 Riverslea shopping mall was opened, which at the time was the largest NZ shopping complex outside of Auckland and Wellington.

- Mana-Tangata, Whenua, Whanau, Hapori


- Keeping active with sport and recreation: Tennis, Squash, Rugby, Netball, Hockey, Football, Bowls, Go Karting, Local Gym, Seniors Fitness and Zumba Classes, Rangitāiki River Walkway, Skate park, Parks and Reserves.
- Great Location: Close proximity to local beaches, lakes, bush, Onepū mountain bike park, Te Teko race course, Awakeri and Kawerau hot pools; these provide access to fishing, hunting, kayaking, walking, swimming, horse riding and mountain biking
- Local Businesses: Diverse business base (small locally owned and run businesses).
- Employment opportunities: Fonterra, Timber Mills (Norske Skog and Carter Holt Harvey), and a strong farming and horticultural region.

- 2. Pride in our identity: We are uniquely "Edgecumbe" we take pride in our town, and want others to stop, shop and visit

- 4. Safe and connected community: The Edgecumbe community is connected, people look after each other and we are prepared for emergencies.

Vibrant community

Great community facilities, parks and reserves:

Community members have said they would like to see a revamping of our all playgrounds, as they are very 'tired looking' and in need of urgent upgrades. Suggestions for new facilities on our parks and reserves, to support and encourage an active community, include walking and cycling tracks, access to our river (small jetty). Alongside the existing facilities, the community have also given input into what they would like to see happen within the new green space established after the removal of the red-sticker homes following the flood in 2017.

- To encourage all ages to play, keep active and attract visitors to our town
- To have quality facilities, playgrounds and destination parks that add value to our community

A Vibrant Town Centre:

Community forums have acknowledged the high-priority for a visual uplift of our CBD including, entrances into the township, because 'first impressions count'. Prior to the flood in 2017, approximately 45 businesses operated in Edgecumbe. The flood directly caused the closure (temporary or permanent) or the relocation of many businesses elsewhere. It is vital that there is a plan to retain and grow our business base.


Safe and connected community
